The text

(1) A proud mum was guest of honour at a wedding after her dead daughter's organs were donated to save the bridegroom's life. Dionne Sheen, 36, saw Jonathan Lancaster in his black suit with his bride after he was given one of her 13-year-old daughter's kidneys and her pancreas.

(2) The mum said: "Everyone was rejoicing and celebrating and I thought, 'this wouldn't be happening but for my girl', I felt such pride. My daughter, Amber, a donor from age ten, was mown down by a car last January outside our home in Salford, Manchester."

(3) Two days after the accident, Jonathan had his life-saving transplant. The girl's organs also saved four other lives - a boy and girl, both 15, and two other kids, one in Singapore.

(4) Jonathan, 32, realized that he had Amber's organs after reading her story in a paper during his recovery. He invited Dionne to the wedding after contacting a transplant coordinator at Manchester Royal Infirmary.

(5) At first Dionne said no "because it was their big day" but Jonathan told her if it wasn't for Amber he wouldn't have been able to marry Claire Webster. Dionne said: "That touched me, so I agreed and I'm glad because they're lovely people. Obviously there were tears, but knowing her death wasn't senseless comforted me. I'm proud Amber has given the gift of life to at least five people"

(6) Jonathan, of Bolton, said: "We called off the wedding four years ago because I was very ill and it seemed we'd never marry. So the wedding was wonderful. But what made it special was meeting Dionne."
