One by one, the utilities were switched off; the TV was taken away and the furniture mysteriously disappeared. Eventually the house was sold. I was glad that I could finally leave home myself. I used to feel bad when people asked, "When did you leave home?" , not wanting to admit to such a bitter truth. Now I don't mind saying, "I didn't leave home - my parents did it for me."
